Obligatory membership

73 On July 1st, 2010, compulsory student union membership was abolished for state-

owned universities. Jönköping University (JU) is a private institution and are not

subject to this law which gave the Foundation board of JU the power to decide tokeep the obligatory membership or not.

78 To ensure a continued and stable student influence at JU the foundation board decided to 79 keep the obligatory membership in the Jönköping Student Union (JSU) for all students at

Jönköping University. This is regulated in "Regulations and guidelines for first-, second- and

81 third-cycle education at Jönköping University" (BRJU).
